Summary of Major Accomplishments in Primary Leadership Positions

Dean, College of Health, Oregon State University, Corvallis, OR (Flagship campus)

- Lead a diverse unit of over 3000 undergraduate and graduate students and 200 faculty and staff members across two campuses (Corvallis, OR and Bend, OR)
- Major areas of research, education, and service in the college include public health (which includes epidemiology, biostatistics, environmental and occupational health, health policy and management, health promotion and health behavior, and global health), nutrition and dietetics, exercise and sports science (which includes kinesiology, adapted physical education, sports psychology, and physical therapy), and human development and family sciences (which includes aging, early childhood education, social justice and health, and non-profit leadership)
- Manage a \$60 million annual budget, including \$20-30 million in research expenditures annually (\$43 million during a particularly fruitful year in FY22)
- Led major structural reorganization and renaming of the college to the “College of Health” to improve cohesion, efficiency, morale, and reputation
- The new college consists of three Schools: The School of Public Health and Nutrition, The School of Exercise and Sports Sciences, and the School of Human Development
- Reorganized and increased tailoring of college communications to better serve the needs of various constituents, including students, staff, faculty, alumni, and community members
- Leading development of a more compelling, clinically-oriented, and experiential pre-health-sciences program aimed at improving student success in medicine, nursing, pharmacy, physician assistant, and other clinical health professions
- Maintain 18 direct reports
- Oversee evaluation, promotion, and tenure process and make final decisions about promotion and tenure
- In keeping with the mission of a land-grant university, significantly increased resources to outreach, engagement, and innovation related to the state of Oregon; this included adding the key position of Associate Dean for Extension and Engagement to improve the impact of the College’s work across the state and region
- Developing an “Oregon Health Corps” program aimed at simultaneously improving student experiences and community engagement
- Substantially increased and tailored programming for faculty, staff, and students aimed at increasing vibrancy, morale, and sense of community
- Developed a pilot-funding initiative to increase collaborations among various units of the College

- Along with the Senior Director of Development, serve as a chief fundraiser, responsible for generating fiscal win-win relationships and stewarding awards, including a current \$55 million campaign
- Substantially improved partnerships and relationships across campus with units such as the College of Business, the College of Science, The College of Veterinary Medicine, the College of Earth, Oceanic, and Atmospheric Sciences, and the College of Pharmacy
- Re-launched a college Community Advisory Council consisting of key alumni, community health advocates, representatives from industry, and other leaders throughout Oregon and the US

- Led a highly diverse unit consisting of 6000 undergraduate and graduate students and 500 faculty and staff members
- The College included 22 research and service units (e.g., Departments, Centers, and Institutes) and offered 48 degrees and 12 certificates
- Major areas of research, education, and service included public health; the Eleanor Mann School of Nursing; statistics and research methodology; K-12 instruction; higher education and educational leadership; educational technology; special education and English for speakers of other languages; education reform and policy; recreation, sports management, and athletic training; exercise science and kinesiology; occupational therapy; adult and lifelong learning; communication sciences and disorders (i.e., speech therapy); mental health and rehabilitation counseling; and human resources & workforce development
- Managed a \$70 million annual budget, including \$20 million in research expenditures annually
- Significantly increased enrollment, particularly in public health and nursing
- Strong fundraising, including new production of at least \$2,000,000 per year and stewardship of over \$40,000,000 in endowed gifts
- In line with the mission of a land-grant institution, substantially increased community engagement and outreach
- Oversaw successful accreditation of multiple programs, including public health, counseling, nursing, teacher training, occupational therapy, and athletic training
- Developed and implemented 5-year strategic plan based on input from multiple constituencies, including administration, faculty, staff, students, alumni, and community members
- Leading major structural reorganization, including development of new departments
- Oversaw selection of four signature areas that cut across all elements of the college and involved education, research, and community outreach: (1) identification, reduction, and

elimination of educational and health-related disparities (e.g., racial/ethnic, socioeconomic, and rural vs. urban), (2) improving the lives of people with disabilities and their caregivers, and (3) leveraging arts and humanities to improve outcomes in education and health care, and (4) balancing opportunities and challenges related to the use of technology in education and health

- Developed a comprehensive plan for integrating 4 community programs that had been struggling programmatically and fiscally into a combined institute aimed at increasing mutually beneficial interaction between the University and the areas of Arkansas with the most extreme poverty and lack of resources
- Improved research infrastructure empowering both students and faculty engaged in research; specific improvements were related to availability of pilot grant funds, new staff members focusing on research, and development of communication pathways to increase transdisciplinary research
- Significantly increased NIH research grants, including R15, R01, and K99/R00 awards
- Substantially increased educational and research collaborations between the College of Education and Health Professions and other key University units, including the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences and the Walton College of Business
- Made final decisions regarding promotion, tenure, endowed chairs, hiring, and dismissal in all areas of the College
- Significantly increased hiring of faculty members and administrators from minority backgrounds underrepresented in academia
- Created and obtained funding for new master's degree in Health Data Analytics in conjunction with the Walton College of Business
- Led College-wide response to the novel Coronavirus (COVID-19), including improving safety protocols, enhancing remote learning options, improving communication, implementing testing protocols, supporting emotionally affected students, and boosting faculty and staff morale

Dean, Honors College, University of Pittsburgh, Pittsburgh, PA (Flagship campus)

- Took responsibility for the academic, social, and emotional well-being and development of about 1600 high-achieving college students
- Interfaced with about 80 faculty members in various fields from across the entire University of Pittsburgh—including Arts & Sciences, Public Health, Engineering, Medicine, Law, Business, Nursing, and Computing and Information—who either served as Honors College faculty fellows and/or taught dedicated honors courses
- Forged new relationships within these units to improve communication, new courses, and other collaborative activities
- Substantially increased the quality and variety of Honors College courses available, focusing on development of a balanced portfolio of offerings in the arts and humanities,

social sciences, and natural sciences

- Developed 5 new weekly programs to engage students, including sessions focused on (1) interaction with alumni, (2) community outreach, and (3) facilitation of applications to major awards such as the Rhodes, Marshall, Truman, Churchill, and Fulbright Scholarships
- Reformed what had been a fragmented advising system into a more nimble, holistic structure that leveraged longitudinal mentorship by PhD- and MFA-level scholars and has resulted in a substantial increase in successful high-impact scholarship applications
- Managed a multi-million dollar annual budget such that each year resulted in a surplus, helping grow our endowment
- Worked with Institutional Advancement and alumni to nurture new donations; one of these resulted ultimately in the naming of the College with a \$65 million gift
- Served on multiple high-level committees, including the Council of Deans, the Provost's Advisory Council on Undergraduate Programs, the Enrollment Management Committee, and the Year of the Healthy University Steering Committee, tasked with enhancing overall student wellness
- Revamped the recruitment system for the Chancellor's Scholars—those individuals who received the highest financial packages available at the University—resulting in an increase from 21% to 53% matriculation among those offered the scholarship
- Worked closely with the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid to improve the admissions process, which had previously relied solely on standardized testing cutoffs, to develop an improved, reliable, and multimodal system considering not only academic achievement but also intellectual curiosity and impactful work for the public good
- Improved offerings around Research Fellowships and Internships to (1) increase the diversity of offerings, (2) forge more substantial relationships with community organizations in order to get students meaningful, practical experiences, (3) increase infrastructure available to students wishing to publish their findings, and (4) diversify the scholarly fields represented
- Improved housing processes and procedures to include (1) more valuable extracurricular offerings, and (2) an additional staff member to improve support and safety
- Handled multiple challenging situations including campus crises, terminations, issues around promotion and tenure, staff and faculty friction, conflicts among Board of Visitors and Board of Trustees members, and contentious situations across the University
- Hired the first African-American, Latina, and Transgender individuals in the history of the Honors College
- Altered the makeup of Honors College Faculty Fellows to increase the proportion of women (54% from 36%) and non-white individuals (24% from 6%) so as to better reflect the University and community population
- Developed a new Faculty Fellows program aimed at increasing faculty engagement, development of interdisciplinary courses, and facilitation of other collaborations

Assistant Vice Chancellor for Research on Health and Society & Director of the Center for Research on Media, Technology, and Health, University of Pittsburgh Schools of the Health Sciences (Public Health, Nursing, Medicine, Dentistry, Rehabilitation, and Pharmacy)

- Attended monthly Executive Committee meetings led by the Senior Vice Chancellor for Health Sciences alongside the Deans of each of the Health Sciences Schools and other Assistant Vice Chancellors
- In the context of those meetings, participated in discussions around allocation of hundreds of millions of dollars in research and clinical funds
- Forged interdisciplinary programs across Health Sciences schools, such as health literacy programming involving the Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Pharmacy
- Worked closely with the Assistant Vice Chancellor for Diversity and Inclusion to improve recruitment and retention of individuals from backgrounds underrepresented in the Health Sciences
- Developed the Program for Research on Media, Technology, and Health and transformed it into the Center for Research on Media, Technology, and Health (MTH), which is now situated across all schools of the Health Sciences and is considered by many to be the leading unit of its kind internationally
- Grew MTH to involve over 30 affiliated faculty and staff members via interdisciplinary projects across fields such as Public Health, Nursing, Medicine, Linguistics, Biomedical Informatics, Pediatrics, Psychiatry, and Social Work
- Received over 30 research grants totaling over \$10 million in research funding from federal, Foundation, and state sources
- Brought substantial positive press and promotion to the University; for example, in 2017 alone, there were 1044 news articles about MTH research reaching about 56,800,000 individuals, and in 2016 there were 1596 news articles that reached about 69,100,000 individuals (estimates provided by University Media Services)
- Involved dozens of undergraduate, graduate, and medical students in research, earning many of these students authorship on peer-reviewed publications, awards, and other accolades
- Formed strong relationships with area schools and other community entities around collaborative research projects, including Carrick High School, Langley High School, Schenley High School, McKeesport High School, Westinghouse High School, the Boys and Girls Club of Pittsburgh, the Salvation Army, and the Turtle Creek Mental Health Association
- In 2017, authored the highest impact article published in the entire University of Pittsburgh system; it was deemed by the *American Journal of Preventive Medicine* to be their #1 manuscript of the year
- MTH research has been cited over 13,000 times in the health, educational, and social

science literature
